Leg. Browning Spearheads Two Projects To Restore the Health of Yaphank Lakes

Legislator Kate Browning has spearheaded two projects that aim to restore the ecological health and recreational opportunities for fishing and boating that constituents have enjoyed for generations on Upper and Lower Yaphank Lake. These activities have been threatened by the catastrophic spread of invasive species in those waters.

In recent years recreational opportunities on the lakes have been severely impacted by the explosive growth of the invasive aquatic weeds watermilfoil and cabomba. The infestation by these non-native species severely limited the swimming, fishing and boating that residents have always enjoyed on these waterways. The health of the lakes and everything that lives in them is also threatened.

cost of \$50,000, on how to eliminate or control the invasive species and restore the health of the lakes. The consultant should be hired by the end of the year.

The second important project initiated by Legislator Browning to improve water quality in these lakes and on the Carmans River is a major storm water remediation initiative on CR-21. This project will play a major role in alleviating the pollution going into the lakes, which is widely seen as a contributing factor to the spread of invasive species. Funding for the project comes from the county's Water

to do a feasibility study, at a cost of

\$200,000, and then a pilot project, at a

Quality Reserve Fund.

The Division of Water Quality
Improvement and the Coalition to Save
the Yaphank Lakes have identified four
direct discharges to the lakes from the
county roadway. The Division of Water
Quality Improvement approved this
project on September 25 and will utilize
County monies to fund it. A resolution to
appropriate these monies was introduced
by Leg. Browning and is expected to be
approved before the end of 2008.
